## **UPDATES FROM MS OSBORNE**

#### **Attendance**

Attending school every day can help your child to achieve their aspirations, and the aspirations you have for them. School attendance is also important for giving them the enrichment opportunities that can help support their social and mental wellbeing.

The research on the link between attendance and attainment is clear; the students with the highest attendance throughout their time in school gain the best GCSE and A Level results.

We appreciate that it can be difficult to know whether your child is too ill to attend school. However, NHS guidance is clear that it is fine to send them in with a minor cough or common cold, provided they don't have a temperature.

We aim for all our students to have an attendance rate of 95% of above. You can monitor your child's attendance data through the Schoolgateway app and ensure that it remains at this rate. If there is anything that we may be concerned about, your child's form tutor, Head of Year, or I will contact you.

## **Transport for London talk**

Degree apprentices Liana and Natasha shared their experiences of their courses and work including nightshifts, working inside the walls of a bridge and under the train tracks as well as taking part in the presentation to encourage engineers and architects of the future.

Many students took the opportunity to ask questions, particularly about degree apprenticeships. This pathway is becoming increasingly popular as you can work and study at the same time, whilst earning a wage.


## **Right Respecting Schools Steering Group**

World Book Day this year takes place on Thursday, March 6th. It is inextricably linked to a child's right to education, freedom of thought and freedom of expression. There are many empowering stories of young people fighting for their right to an education. Malala Yousafzai, who was targeted because of her writing and shot on her way to school by the Taliban, may be the most famous.

One lesser-known figure is Mary Prince, who grew up enslaved and went on to become the first woman to write a slave narrative. Particularly important for a group of people largely denied an education and access to literature, this narrative, in which those who'd suffered under the trans-Atlantic slave trade shared their experiences, was a key tool of the abolitionist movement. Having been taken to London, where the legal system did not support slavery, Prince left her former enslavers, meeting Thomas Pringle in 1828.

As a result of her enslavement, she was effectively illiterate.





She worked with Susanna Strickland, to whom she dictated her story, and Pringle, who edited it. The History of Mary Prince, A West-Indian Slave, Related by Herself was published in 1831. World Book Day's importance in the area of child and human rights is only increasing. According to PEN America, a group which campaigns for human rights and freedom of expression, American schools have removed a large number of books from schools, libraries and shop shelves. Not only does this mean that young people are limited from developing adequate literacy and analytical skills, but it significantly limits their ability to think freely. World Book Day is an opportunity to celebrate the joy reading provides for us along with our freedom to read. As World Book Day comes up, we must all ensure we honour and recognise the value of reading.

## **Remembering Miss Jean Clayton**

We are sorry to share the news that a former member of staff, Miss Jean Clayton, died in January. A memorial service for Miss Clayton took place at St Paul's Church in Cheam at the end of February.

Miss Clayton taught PE at Nonsuch from the late 1970s until her retirement in 2000. She was a committed teacher who gave many hours to the pupils of the school supporting extracurricular activities at lunchtimes and after school. She ran numerous teams in netball, hockey and tennis, and following her retirement, she accompanied the ballgirls to Queen's on a voluntary basis. Miss Clayton was also a Form Tutor to many students throughout her time at the school.

On her retirement, Miss Clayton presented 'The Clayton Cup' which is still awarded annually to a Year 9 student who has made the largest contribution to extra-curricular PE. She particularly wanted to acknowledge the contribution made by students in the Lower School. We will remember her commitment to Nonsuch.
